## Directions to the Sheraton Crossroads Hotel

### **From North**

Take New York State Thruway (I-87) South to Route 17 South (exit 15). Follow for 1 mile and take the Mountainside Avenue Crossroads Boulevard Exit. Follow signs to hotel.

### **From West**

Take I-80 East to Route 17 North and follow Route 17 North for approximately 14 miles. Exit at Mountainside Ave/Crossroads Boulevard. Or take Route 202 North to Route 17 North to Mountainside Ave/Crossroads Boulevard.

### **From Northeast**

Take the New York State Thruway (Route 87 North/Route 287 West) to Exit 15 (Route 287 South) to Exit 66 (Route 17 South/Mahwah). Once on Route 17 South, take the exit on the right at Mountainside Avenue/Crossroads Boulevard.

### **From South**

Take Garden State Parkway North to Exit 163 or take I-80 to Route 17 North. Follow Route 17 North approximately 14 miles. Exit at Mountainside Avenue/Crossroads Boulevard. You can also take Route 287 North to 17 South.

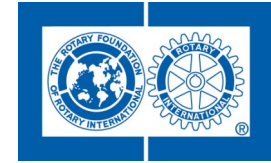
### **From Newark International Airport**

Follow the signs out of the airport for the New Jersey Turnpike/ I-95. Take the turnpike to Exit 16W. Take Route 3 West to Route 17 North and continue for approximately 18 miles. Exit at Mountainside Avenue/Crossroads Boulevard.

## Lynmar Brock, Jr., PRID Relief Efforts for Refugees from Afghanistan



Mr. Brock was born in 1934, and educated at Dartmouth College with an AB degree in 1955 and an MBA degree in 1956. He joined the United States Navy serving as an Officer in the Destroyer Force, Atlantic Fleet from 1956-1958 and in the Office of the Chief of Naval Operations at the Pentagon, Washington, DC, from 1958-1959. He was President and CEO of Brock and Company, Inc. from 1962 through 2007. His Rotary International offices have included: President, Rotary Club of Philadelphia, PA; 1974-75; District Governor for District 7450; 1978-79; Director, Rotary International; 1992-94; Chairman, Executive Committee of the Board; 1993-94; Chairman for Rotary International Afghan Refugee Relief Effort Committee; 2001-04; Chair Osaka Convention Promotion Committee; Chair Los Angeles Convention Promotion Committee; Chair Districting Committee; Chair The Extension Committee; and Chair of the Marketing and Licensing Committee; His awards include Board of Directors *Service Above Self* Award; Citation for Meritorious Service from the Rotary Foundation and the Distinguished Service Award from the Rotary Foundation; 2007. In addition, he served as Chairman of the Board of Trustees of Peirce College, Chairman of the Board of Kendal Corporation, Chairman of the Board of Supervisors of Edgmont Township, Chairman of the International Food Service Management Guild, and Chairman of the Mobile Industrial Caterers Association International. Mr. Brock has published two novels with Amazon: Must Thee Fight and In This Hospitable Land. His third novel, Genevieve, will be published later this year.

## D. F. Pace Rotary District 7450 Peace Fellowship Alumnus



Lieutenant D F Pace, a distinguished member of the Philadelphia Police Department, has just completed three months of study at the prestigious Chulalongkorn University in Bangkok, Thailand, as part of a Peace Fellowship awarded by Rotary International and sponsored by the Rotary Club of Philadelphia.. His curriculum focused on violence prevention, mediation, compromise building and the philosophy of peace-building. Lieutenant Pace is now sharing what he has learned in Bangkok with other Philadelphia police officers.

Born in Italy and raised in the humble surroundings of an immigrant family, Lieutenant Pace exemplifies the finest qualities of a law enforcement officer. He is truly "self made" with a tremendous work ethic. Indeed, he is one of only five lawyers among Philadelphia's 6000 police officers. He has extensive patrol experience in the field and he is also a valued instructor in the Philadelphia Police Academy. In his teaching, he echoes the vision of Philadelphia's Police Commissioner Charles Ramsay toward creating a new generation of police officers with enhanced professionalism, dramatically improved judgment skills, and a true dedication to being instruments of peace.

Philadelphia is one of the most socio-economically and ethnically diverse cities in the world. The enlightened top-level leadership of the Philadelphia Police Department understands these challenges and views the potential of this Rotary Peace Fellowship as a tremendous asset.
